
Consider the Lilies of the Field




For Ages 5 through 13

Matthew 6:28:29

"Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow. They toil not, neither do they spin; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."



Fun Fall Bulb Planting Activity

Planting daffodil bulbs in the Fall is a fun way to learn how flowers can teach us important lessons. This activity teaches a wonderful lesson on patience, because planting the bulbs is quick and easy, but waiting for them to grow takes time and a lot of patience. It takes time to grow as a Christian, too. God is very patient with us, and gives us all we need over our life time to bring forth a beautiful flowering character.



What you will need:

- a flower pot with a whole in the bottom about 10 to 12 inches in diameter and 10 to 12 inches in depth
- a base to set it on so that it doesn't leak water
- garden potting soil
- depending on the size or your pot, between 6 to 10 daffodil bulbs per pot (be sure they are full size, because if they are not, they may not bloom this year)
- some slow-release bulb fertilizer to work into the top of the potting soil (you can also use regular fertilizer with a watering can—follow directions so you don't over fertilize)
- a layer of mulch for the top of the soil
- some sunlight, some water, some patience
- Step 1: Fill your pot only a third up from the bottom with potting soil.
- Step 2: With your fingers, make little dents into the soil and place bulbs in the hole.
- Step 3: Cover the bulbs with soil up to an inch below the rim of the pot.
- Step 4: If you have it, work a little of the slow-release bulb fertilizer into the top of the potting soil.
- Step 5: Cover soil with a layer of mulch.
- Step 6: Place in a sunny spot and water about every 4 days. Be sure to put the pot on a base to protect your table. If you didn't put slow-release fertilizer into the soil, fertilize with regular fertilizer in a watering can about once a week. Follow instructions, so you don't over fertilize.
